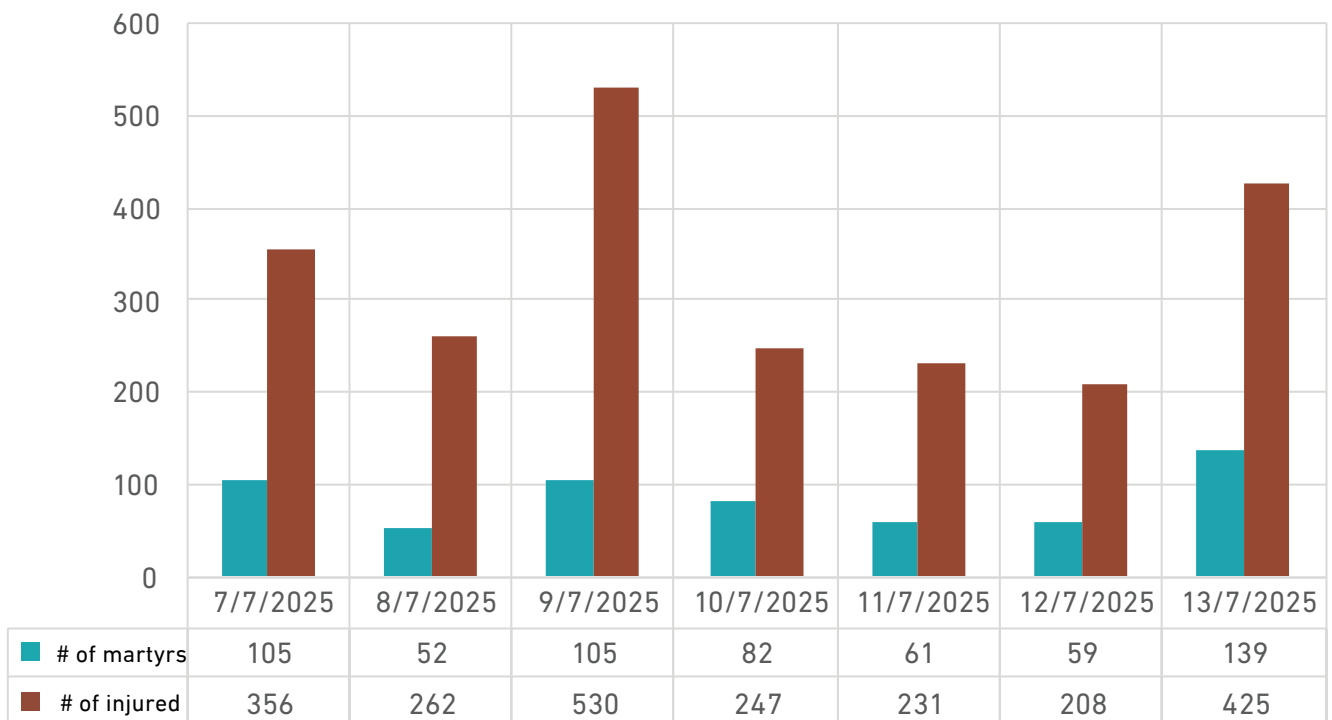

Key Humanitarian Updates This Week



Gaza's Water Authority Warns of Imminent Disaster Due to Fuel Shortage

Gaza's Water Authority reported that diesel fuel supplies will only last for one more week before a catastrophe occurs.

- Water well production has decreased by approximately 70% due to Israel's ban on fuel deliveries.
- Since the beginning of military operations in March, no fuel has been supplied for water wells across the Gaza Strip.



Infant Mortality in Gaza Rises Sixfold

- The death rate among infants under one month of age has increased six times compared to the period before October 7, 2023.

- Severe malnutrition is worsening among newborns in Gaza's hospitals due to the depletion of infant formula and nutritional supplements, compounded by the ongoing Israeli blockade.

Neonatal units are overwhelmed with infants facing slow and painful deaths amid dire shortages in resources and deteriorating health infrastructure.



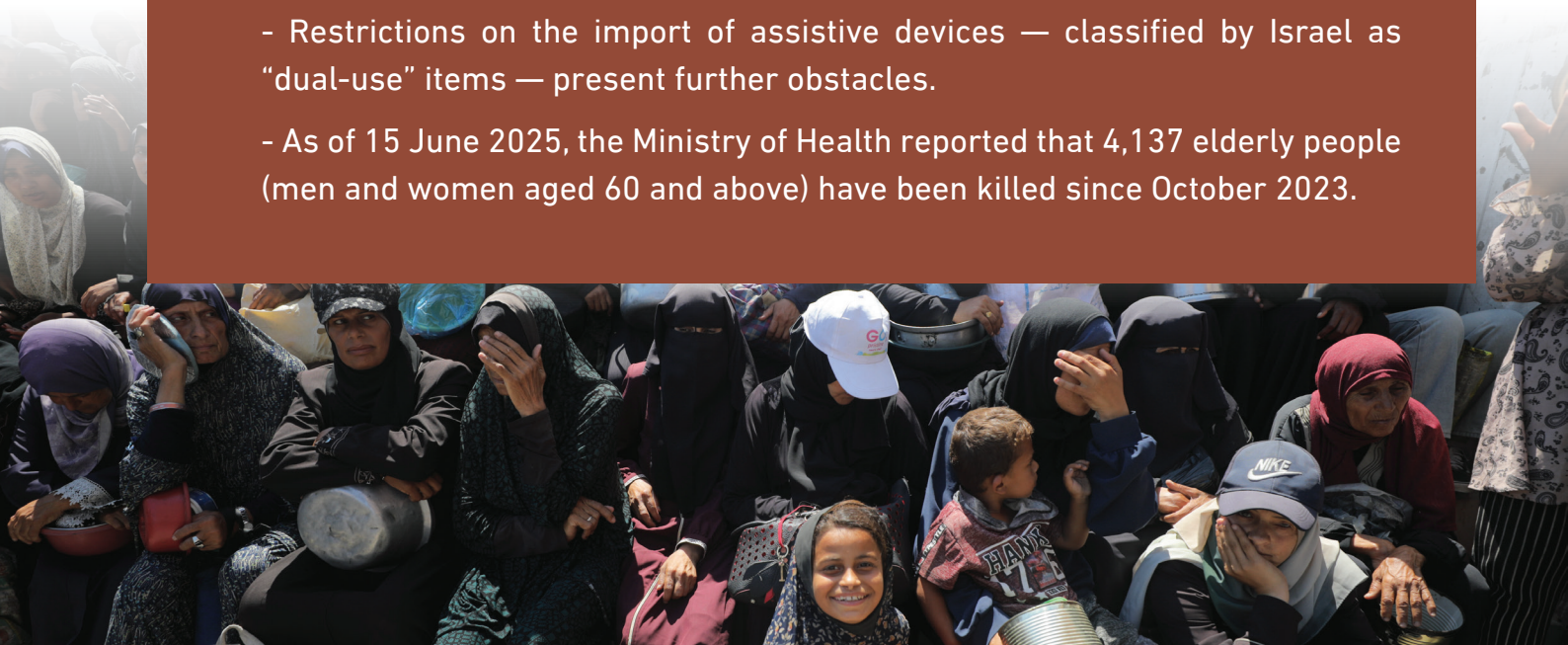
Elderly People Face Severe Risks Amid Ongoing War

Older persons are often left without protection, basic support, or access to essential survival needs.

- Repeated forced displacement, chronic health conditions, the collapse of health and support systems, and severe shortages of food, clean water, and overcrowded living conditions have all worsened the risks for the elderly.

- Restrictions on the import of assistive devices — classified by Israel as "dual-use" items — present further obstacles.

- As of 15 June 2025, the Ministry of Health reported that 4,137 elderly people (men and women aged 60 and above) have been killed since October 2023.



Key Risks Threatening the Sector

Risks in Numbers:

- Between 27 May and 13 July, 833 people waiting for humanitarian aid died after reaching Gaza hospitals, and more than 5,432 were injured.
- 1.25 million people are facing catastrophic levels of hunger, and 96% of Gaza's population suffers from severe food insecurity.
- In June alone, over 5,800 Palestinian children in Gaza were diagnosed with malnutrition.



Critical Shortages in Blood Banks and Laboratories:

- Gaza's laboratories and blood banks are facing a severe shortage of blood units and components, amid a rising number of critical injuries.
- The available blood supply remains far below the monthly demand, despite the urgent need.
- Efforts to encourage blood donations from the local population have largely failed, as widespread malnutrition and anemia have left many residents physically unable to donate, deepening the ongoing health crisis.



Fuel Crisis Driving Health and Humanitarian Sectors to Collapse:

The worsening fuel crisis is pushing Gaza's health and humanitarian sectors to the brink of total collapse, severely impacting hospitals, desalination plants, and water supply networks.

- Hospitals in Gaza City, particularly Al-Shifa Hospital, are on the verge of shutting down. The dialysis unit has already ceased operations to conserve electricity for intensive care units and operating rooms amid the continuous influx of casualties.
- Thirteen patients are currently in intensive care units, most of them on ventilators. Around 100 newborns are in incubators, and 350 patients rely on dialysis services – all face critical and immediate risk.
- Operating rooms are expected to stop functioning, and medical teams will be unable to treat the overwhelming number of injured.
- Oxygen plants will also shut down, and a hospital without oxygen can no longer be called a hospital.



It should be noted that the Gaza Strip needs support in the following sectors:



Healthcare Sector

- 1 Fuel for hospitals
- 2 Medicines and medical supplies
- 3 Field hospitals
- 4 Supplies for safe childbirth in hospitals
- 5 Postpartum kits



Shelter Sector

- 1 Mattresses and blankets
- 2 Tents for IDPs
- 3 Cash intervention



Relief Sector

- 1 Food parcels, fresh bread and canned foods
- 2 Drinking water
- 3 Cooking gas
- 4 Clothing
- 5 Fuel for municipalities to operate water pumping stations
- 6 Cash intervention (Gaza and West Bank)
